

The Second Sunday before Lent



In the beginning was the Word ...

When bibles were first produced, the scribes would illuminate the precious manuscript working in prayerful focus to produce wonderful illustrations of minute detail and intricacy. One such is the Book of Kells, from around 800 CE, whose focus is very much on the visual impression of the art. The beholder is thus drawn into the majesty and mystery of God's word.

To celebrate the 400th Anniversary of the King James Bible, a new set of illustrated meditations on the text was commissioned from the abstract Japanese artist Makoto Fujimura. You see here his frontispiece for St John's Gospel, entitled 'In the beginning was the Word.'

John I speaks not only about Jesus, the Word which was in the beginning at the origin of creation, but also about the mystery of all creation.

In this abstract picture we too are drawn into this mystery; we see the darkness dispersing in the colours of creation – the light appearing within colour itself. The picture is not intended to depict the story – for the words do that much better; but to slow the reader down as their eye drifts through the illustration, opening mind and heart as they contemplate the Word of God.

And while echoing Japanese traditions, here we have art with no borders, no limits.

In the beginning was the Word. And the Word was with God and the Word was God.

Almighty God, you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and for ever. Amen.

The Old Testament Reading: Proverbs 8. 1, 22-31

The Gospel: John 1.1-14

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world. He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God. And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.


Public Worship and Private Prayer


