El Greco: Christ driving the Money Changers from the Temple (1568) National Gallery of Art, Washington DC

The Third Sunday of Lent

The dramatic incident of Christ driving the money changers from the Temple (the Cleansing of the Temple) is recounted in all four Gospels. In the synoptics, it takes place towards the end of Jesus' life, after the final entry into Jerusalem prior to his arrest, crucifixion and resurrection. John, however, places it early in his Gospel, not long after the start of Jesus' ministry. The timing of the incident is not of great importance; far more significant is Jesus' anger at the misuse of his Father's house, and his burning need to cleanse it of dishonest dealing and exploitation of the poor.

Despite his early placing of this event, only John has Jesus speak of his forthcoming death and resurrection, referring to the temple of his body which will be destroyed and then after three days be raised up.

Each of us, at our baptism, was filled with the Holy Spirit and our bodies became a temple, a dwellingplace for God. But there's a danger that, as time has

gone by, we may have succumbed to the influences of the world around us and our hearts may have turned into a 'marketplace.' I pray that, if that is the case, then during Lent the tables in us may be overturned and our hearts cleansed in readiness for Easter and the resurrection.

The Collect for the Third Sunday of Lent

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Old Testament Reading: Exodus 20.1-17

Then God spoke all these words: I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me. You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the LORD your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments. You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the LORD your God, for the LORD will not acquit anyone who misuses his name. Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy. Six days you shall labour and do all your work. But the seventh day is a sabbath to the LORD your God; you shall not do any work—you, your son or your daughter, your male or female slave, your livestock, or the alien resident in your towns. For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but rested the seventh day; therefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day and consecrated it.

Honour your father and your mother, so that your days may be long in the land that the LORD your God is giving you. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour. You shall not covet your neighbour's house; you shall not covet your neighbour's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbour.

The Gospel: John 2.13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.
