

THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON: Genesis 28; 10-17 read by Mr Samuel Wiggs Chairman of the Church Development Committee

Jacob left Beer-sheba and went towards Haran. He came to a certain place and stayed there for the night, because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of the place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. And he dreamed that there was a ladder set up on the earth, the top of it reaching to heaven; and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it. And the LORD stood beside him and said, 'I am the LORD, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring. THE NEW TESTAMENT LESSON: I Peter 2 read by Mrs Elizabeth Young A member of the Development Committee

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: 'See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.'

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner', and 'A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall.'

They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvellous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

Bishop Let us pray

The people remain standing

We give you thanks, loving God, for this parish church and house of prayer.

May all who enter it find peace and comfort; encouragement, hope and challenge.

May your name be glorified here and your people inspired to serve and to witness in this community, in their several places of work, learning and leisure, and in the wider world.

Hear us now as we dedicate to you the work that has been done on this entrance, and pray your blessing upon our plans for the coming development and refurbishing of this church that it may continue to be a blessing for all who pass this way.

The Bishop blesses the refurbished North porch and main entrance to the church, sprinkling it with holy water and saying:

'I was glad when they said to me, "Let us go to the house of the Lord".' (Psalm 122. 1)

'Truly this is none other than the house of God. This is the gate of heaven.' (Genesis 28. 17)

'See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; ... whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.' (I Peter 2. 6)
