

Christ the King

Canon Judy Anderson writes:

I remember vividly an occasion not long after I had completed my training. I was leading Evensong on an autumn evening, when the weather was just beginning to turn colder. All was going smoothly, until I became aware of a bit of a commotion at the back of the church. I looked up and, to my horror, saw a downand-out who had wandered in dragging behind him a dishevelledlooking dog on a string. What should I do? What if this intruder disrupted our well-ordered service? He was an embarrassment among our middle-class congregation. With relief, I saw my vicar get up from his seat near the back and walk towards the man. 'Thank goodness,' I thought, 'he'll get him to leave.' But he

didn't. Ray sat down beside the man and, I assume, spoke to him and made him welcome. After a while, he left, much as he had arrived, shuffling out with his dog in tow. The relief was palpable as we all relaxed.

The reading that evening was the same one we have as our Gospel this morning. 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' That was us. We had failed to welcome this stranger. Had we failed to welcome Christ, Christ the King, our King? We had felt uncomfortable at his presence. Now I felt worse than uncomfortable at my attitude, my exclusivity and my fear of the unexpected and the unknown. It was a very clear lesson, and a hard one.

How much better the world would be if we looked for Christ in everyone we meet. How much better the world would be if people treated each other as they would treat Christ. Let's take as our watchword the words of Christ, our King: 'Just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.'

The Collect for Christ the King

Eternal Father, whose Son Jesus Christ ascended to the throne of heaven that he might rule over all things as Lord and King: keep the Church in the unity of the Spirit and in the bond of peace, and bring the whole created order to worship at his feet; who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Old Testament Reading: Ezekiel 34. 11-16, 20-24

The Gospel: Matthew 25.31-46

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."
